## Request

1. Please provide the 2025 figures for the first two tables on the website <https://comite.je/dog-licence/>.
2. I understand that it is intended to increase the dog licence fee to £20. I can find no reference to this. Please provide the relevant minute and draft order.

## Response

1. The Freedom of Information (Jersey) Law 2011 gives a right to request information that is held in recorded form, unless exempt.

A summary of the 2025 dog licence information is intended for future publication on the [Comité Des Connétables | Jersey Parishes](#) website at the end of 2025. (FOI exemption information intended for future publication Article 36 applies)

2. The information regarding the dog licence fee is detailed on the [Dog Licence | Comité des Connétables](#) website and states that: "The licence fee is £10 per dog, lasts for 1 year and must be renewed by 31 January each year. Applications after 31 January cost £20 per dog." The cost of a dog licence only increases to £20 if the application is late and submitted after 31 January each year.

The Comité des Connétables minutes regarding the dog licence fee being increased to £10 and for any late applications being double this amount can be found on the Comité website as per the published Comité minutes dated 29 November 2019 [Comite-des-Connetables-non-exempt-minutes-29November-2019.pdf](#) (FOI exemption Article 23 information accessible by other means applies)

## FOI exemptions applied:

### Article 23 - Information accessible to applicant by other means

Information is absolutely exempt information if it is reasonably available to the applicant, otherwise than under this Law, whether or not free of charge. A scheduled public authority that refuses an application for information on this ground must make reasonable efforts to inform the applicant where the applicant may obtain the information.

### Article 36 - Information intended for future publication

(1) Information is qualified exempt information if, at the time when the request for the information is made, the information is being held by a public authority with a view to its being published within 12 weeks of the date of the request.
