Request

Please could I request details for each of the following years, 2023, 2024 & 2025 for the Parish of St Helier the number of Non-Disclosure, Compromise Agreements & JACS1 Agreements which have been entered into each year and the total values of these agreements for each year.

Response

Due to the low number of cases, a disclosure control has been applied and a total of eight agreements have been entered into by the Parish of St Helier between 1 January 2023 and the 31 December 2025 totalling £142,510.91.

Comprise agreements including non-disclosure agreements (NDAs) or JACS1 forms (used in relation to staff employment) may be signed for several different reasons including:

- in settlement arrangements including redundancy for termination of employment
- due to certain staff members undertaking certain sensitive work
- prior to or as part of a commercial agreement at or for the benefit of the organisation and
- arrangements with external investigators.

The total figure also includes statutory notice periods and annual leave owed.

Further details of non-disclosure agreements, compromise agreements and JACS1 agreements entered into by the Parish of St Helier are absolutely exempt under Article 25 (2) (personal information) and Article 26 (supplied in confidence) of the Freedom of Information (Jersey) Law 2011.



Articles applied:

Article 25(2) - Personal Information - Personal data, applicant not subject but supply contravenes data protection principles

Information is absolutely exempt information if – (a) it constitutes personal data of which the applicant is not the data subject as defined in the Data Protection (Jersey) Law 2018; and (b) its supply to a member of the public would contravene any of the data protection principles, as defined in that Law.

Article 26 - Information supplied in confidence

Information is absolutely exempt information if –

(a) it was obtained by the scheduled public authority from another person (including another public authority); and

(b) the disclosure of the information to the public by the scheduled public authority holding it would constitute a breach of confidence actionable by that or any other person.
